 - i. Students today face complex life situations that can be challenging to manage, so it is important for parents to know the signs to watch for when a student is in distress. School psychologists and counselors from Blue Valley schools will share information about the signs of suicide ideation and what to do when you are worried about your child. They will also review the suicide prevention practices and activities that occur in schools.

Meeting Topic: The Middle School Experience

- I. The Middle School Experience- Shelly Nielson Exec. Director of School Administration K-8.
 - a. There are 9 middle schools in BV. We used to be on a very traditional schedule until this year when the district rolled out changes encompassing curriculum, academics, mindset, integration, critical thinking.
 - i. Showed video- link in presentation attached
 - b. More specific changes:
 - Longer core time and teachers can connect lessons- used to be about 42-44 min, now it's 54-55 minutes which teachers and students have really liked. They can dig deeper.
 - ii. Flex time- 25 minutes to focus on counselor lessons, social emotional learning, intervention during that time the kids core teachers are available for help.
 Guided study didn't have that availability. Still trying to have a predictable pattern to it as well.
 - iii. Now 3 elective slots instead of 2. PE is required.
 - i. In 6th grade they are either quarter or semester long (except music and world language) so they have 12 spots to fill total for the year.
 - ii. 7th and 8th the electives are all at least a semester.
 - iv. Integration of ELA and Reading together into one class which has increased flexibility and helped stabilize class size.
 - v. Reading strategy and intervention time applies to kids outside of special ed
 - vi. Special Ed can now be every day instead of every other
 - vii. Student Instructional Time (SIT) can include co-teaching, more differentiated learning
 - c. Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum
 - d. Courses
 - i. 5th grade teachers will make recommendation for advanced math placement
 - ii. Some electives go across all grade levels, some don't
 - iii. If your child wants to do a language, they must enroll in 6th grade otherwise they cannot do it. They have to take the full program all three years to equal the first year of language at high school.
 - iv. Taking art all 3 years also helps you skip a level in high school. No other electives do that.
 - v. Online PE only available in 7th and 8th grade for students who have a full schedule or looking for more flexibility. It's a first semester option.

 They have to wear a heartrate monitor. If your kid is very physically fit and has a low heart rate, it may be hard for them to hit the weekly goals.

vi. Flex time

 Students are assigned to a grade-level teacher, but they can access other teachers. They are still tweaking this at each school to find the best structure.

e. IEP Services

- i. This can happen during flex, during electives, or others. It's up to teams to decide what may be the best fit for a student.
- ii. It may be helpful for a child to take gifted as an elective for the first semester of 6th grade to get to know the teacher and kids better before branching out. That way the teacher gets to know them much better and quicker.

- h. Intramurals
 - i. Most organized sports don't start until 7th grade so this gives kids 4-8 week chunks of sports that are more informal. How many times a week is up to the sponsor.
 - ii. Different schools offer different activities.
- i. Blended Learning and Canvas- blending face-to-face learning with technology
 - i. Starting next year 6th graders will get a Chromebook- it has filters. It is to be used as a tool, not a toy. It has insurance. 6th graders will get some training first before getting the computer.
 - ii. Canvas is used as daily gradebook, assignment calendar, and instruction as well. Parents can access. Some teachers are still learning how to use it and others are very familiar so there may not be consistency yet. There is parent training for it.
 - iii. The parent version and the student version are different, so try to get access to both.
 - iv. If families don't have internet/wifi, the district can help. They also have plans if you think you child is not capable yet of handling their own computer.
 - v. The district has ways to monitor activity that may be a red flag for issues that need to be addresses.

i. Questions:

- i. Can we monitor the kids' activity on the chromebook? Not right not unless it's of a serious nature.
- ii. No phones or apple watches during school hours only before and after school
- iii. What is happening with executive function in schools? It's up to each school, but it's a possible focus during intervention/flex time either in a group setting or individually.
